The institution has used all funds received under the HEERF II: Proprietary Institutions Grant Funds for Students Coronavirus Response and relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 Section 314(a)(4), (CRRSAA) (Pub. L. 116-260).

### Attachment A - Methods used by Institution

The methodology used by the institution to determine which students received emergency financial aid grants and how much they would receive under received HEERF II: Proprietary Institutions Grant Funds for Students is as follows:

- 1. The institution developed its own system and process for determining how to allocate the emergency financial aid grant funds, which included distribution of funds to all students eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under received HEERF II: Proprietary Institutions Grant Funds for Students.
- 2. The institution complied with the statutory requirement that the funds be used to cover expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus (including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance, such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and childcare).
- 3. An Eligibility Form was sent to students to that the institution used to determine students' eligibility for the grant and the amount for which students were eligible, [see Attachment B-Communication #2B]
- 4. The institution prioritized the students with the greatest need and established a maximum funding threshold of \$1349.15 to ensure that these funds were distributed as widely as possible.
- 5. The institution considered students with the lowest EFC of zero (0) for the current academic year first to determine which students received the maximum grant amount of \$800 and determined pro-rated grant amounts ranging from \$285.87 to \$1349.15 for students with EFC's greater than 0 or that are Title IV eligible, but not Pell Eligible.
